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Welcome to SOAR

Mission

SOAR is a BYU college preparation & scholarship program that gives opportunities to multicultural students from various backgrounds (geographic, socioeconomic, racial, ethnic, and educational) to be exposed to BYU and to guide them in becoming strong contributors at BYU.

Objectives

In conjunction with both the missions of BYU and Multicultural Student Services, SOAR aims to:

1. Identify students who have the capacity to contribute to BYU's unique mission.
2. Provide exposure to college life (academically, socially, culturally, and spiritually) and receive instruction, practice, and educational resources to succeed at BYU.
3. Strengthen students' BYU admissions application using the Aims of a BYU education
4. Connect students to various university departments
5. Educate students in finding on and off-campus scholarship opportunities
6. Evaluate students' financial needs in order to provide MSS need-based scholarships
7. Assign a multicultural advisor to each student to connect and increase belonging at BYU
8. If admitted to BYU, continue to provide advocacy for students to reach their potential

Multicultural Student Services Mission Statement

Multicultural Student Services is a team of specialists committed to the development of domestic minority students within The Aims of a BYU Education. We help students navigate their personal academic journey through holistic advisement and financial aid opportunities. We enrich the campus community through cultural events and outreach efforts. Our programs and services include: sponsoring college preparation programs, fostering leadership development & opportunities, providing cultural events to educate & promote inclusivity, tracking academic progress of students and advising in academic, cultural, financial, social & personal needs.

SOAR Standards

As a SOAR participant, you are expected to use good judgment in your interactions with others.

You should use clean language that encourages, uplifts, and compliments others. The use of profane language, vulgar and crude conversations and jokes are not acceptable.

While you may develop a close relationship with your SOAR counselors, they are not mental health professionals. We encourage you to speak to your parents or church leaders if you feel the need to discuss concerns regarding but not limited to...

- Mental health issues (e.g., suicide, depression, anxiety)
- Past or current serious transgressions
- Same-sex attraction or sexual preferences

These standards apply to all forms of communication, including verbal conversations in person, on the phone, or by video conference, as well as correspondence by email, letters, texting, social media, and any other methods before, during or after the program. Private messaging between participants and SOAR Counselors is prohibited.

Additionally, involvement in any of these behaviors will result in your being sent home immediately.

1. Participating in or encouraging immoral behavior of any kind, which includes breaking the law of chastity and viewing pornography in any form.
2. Shoplifting, theft, or vandalism of any kind.
3. Breaking the Word of Wisdom, including the possession of illegal substances.
4. Possession of weapons or firearms of any kind.
5. Doing anything harmful to yourself or others; physically, spiritually, or emotionally.

Parents and participants may report any inappropriate communications or behavior of SOAR staff by calling the SOAR Administration at (801) 422-5971.

Remember that you are a participant at an institution sponsored by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, and you have agreed to comply with the BYU Honor Code. A participant who disregards these SOAR Standards may be subject to appropriate sanctions up to and including dismissal without refund.

- Spiritually Strengthening - build a testimony, learn by the spirit, come unto Christ
- Intellectually Enlarging - communicate effectively, be aware of global concerns, acquire well-rounded knowledge
- Character Building - develop courage, be ethical, practice integrity
- Leading to Lifelong Learning and Service - apply righteousness, develop altruism, be charitable



Church Educational System Honor Code

Brigham Young University and other Church Educational System institutions exist to provide an education in an atmosphere consistent with the ideals and principles of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Each member of the BYU community personally commits to observe these Honor Code standards approved by the Board of Trustees "at all times and in all things, and in all places" (Mosiah 18:9):

- Be honest.
- Live a chaste and virtuous life, including abstaining from any sexual relations outside a marriage between a man and a woman.
- Respect others, including the avoidance of profane and vulgar language.
- Obey the law and follow campus policies.
- Abstain from alcoholic beverages, tobacco, tea, coffee, vaping, and substance abuse.
- Participate regularly in Church services (required only of Church members).
- Observe Brigham Young University's dress and grooming standards.
- Encourage others in their commitment to comply with the Honor Code.

Dress and Grooming Standards

SOAR attendees are required to abide by the BYU dress and grooming standards which reflect the direction of the Board of Trustees and the church publication For the Strength of Youth. Men

A clean and well-cared-for appearance should be maintained.

- Clothing is inappropriate when it is sleeveless, revealing, or form-fitting.
- Shorts must be knee-length or longer.
- Hairstyles should be clean and neat, avoiding extreme styles or colors, and trimmed above the collar, leaving the ear uncovered.
- Sideburns should not extend below the earlobe or onto the cheek.
- If worn, mustaches should be neatly trimmed and may not extend beyond or below the corners of the mouth.
- Men are expected to be clean-shaven; beards are not acceptable.
- Earrings and other body piercings are not acceptable. Shoes should be worn in all public campus areas

Women

A clean and well-cared-for appearance should be maintained.

- Clothing is inappropriate when it is sleeveless, strapless, backless, or revealing; has slits above the knee; or is form fitting.
- Dresses, skirts, and shorts must be knee-length or longer.
- Hairstyles should be clean and neat, avoiding extremes in styles or colors.
- Excessive ear piercing (more than one per ear) and all other body piercings are unacceptable.
- Shoes should be worn in all public campus areas.

UNIVERSITY

ADD/DROP PERIOD

The add/drop period is a specific timeframe at the beginning of a semester when students can add or drop courses from their schedule without any academic or financial penalties.

BACHELOR'S DEGREE

A bachelor's degree is awarded to a student by a university upon completion of a program of study, usually taking around four years. It is the first degree you can earn after graduating from high school.

CREDIT

Credit refers to the value assigned to a course, representing the number of hours you need to spend in class each week.

DEAN'S LIST

The Dean's List is an honor roll that recognizes students who have achieved outstanding academic performance usually during a semester.

FIRST GENERATION STUDENT

A first-generation student is someone who is the first in their immediate family to attend college or pursue higher education.

GREEK LIFE

Greek life refers to social organizations, called fraternities for men and sororities for women, that exist on college campuses.

INTERNSHIP

An internship is a temporary work experience that students undertake while still in school, allowing them to gain skills and experience in their field of study.

MAJOR

A major is the primary field of study that a student chooses to specialize in during their undergraduate education.

MINOR

In addition to declaring a major in undergraduate studies, many learners declare a minor. A minor requires fewer credits than a major but allow for directed study.

ORIENTATION

Orientation is an event or program organized by the university to introduce new students to the campus, its resources, and academic policies.

PREREQUISITES

Prerequisites are courses that students must complete before enrolling in more advanced or specialized courses.

RESIDENT ADVISOR (RA)

An RA is a student who lives in a dormitory and serves other students living in the same dorm by providing guidance, support, and help maintaining a positive living environment.

STUDY ABROAD

Study abroad refers to the opportunity for students to spend a semester or academic year studying in a foreign country.

TITLE IX

Title IX is a US law that stops sex discrimination in schools, by addressing issues like sexual harassment, gender-based violence, and ensuring fairness between genders in education.

UNDECLARED

Undeclared refers to a student who has not yet chosen a specific major or area of study.

WAITLIST

When a class or program is full, some students may be placed on a waitlist. Being on the waitlist means you are in line for a spot in the class or program if a seat becomes available.

CAPS

BYU Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS) provides counseling services, teaches Student Development Classes, provides outreach trainings, and participates in the clinical training of doctoral student programs.

CHAPLAIN

The university chaplain is responsible for the religious and spiritual well-being of the campus community.



COSMO

Cosmo the Cougar has been Brigham Young University's beloved mascot for over 60 years! For more than half a century, Cosmo has prowled the BYU campus, interacting with students, fans and the community.

COUGAR CASH

Cougar cash is cash available on your student account, that can be used to pay for things on campus. There are many benefits of using cougar cash such as no taxes are paid/added to on-campus purchases.

COUGAREAT

Cougareat is BYU's food court. This includes restaurants such as Subway, Chick-Fil-A, and Wendys.

COUGARETTES

The Cougarettes are BYU's dance team. They perform at athletic events on the BYU campus and compete in national events.

COUGAR TAIL

Cougar Tails are 15-inch long maple donut bars. They were first sold in 2006, and quickly became one of college sports' best-selling confections.



DEVOTIONAL

A regular gathering held every Tuesday where speakers, including leaders from The Church and university personnel, teach and affirm the spiritual aspect of the BYU experience.

HONOR CODE

The Honor Code is BYU's code of conduct. This code of conduct creates an atmosphere consistent with the ideals and principles of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.



LIVING LEGENDS

Living Legends celebrates the native cultural heritage of North and South America and the South Pacific through music, costume, and dance.

OFFICE OF BELONGING

The Office of Belonging promotes a learning environment and community of belonging that is anchored in eternal truths and the teachings of Jesus Christ.



RELIGION REQUIREMENTS

Graduation from BYU requires completion of 14 credit hours of approved religious education courses.

ROC/ROC PASS

The ROC Pass will get a BYU student in to any BYU ticketed sporting event. Seating is general admission - usually in a specific student section.




STUDIO 1030

Studio 1030 is BYU's own salon and barber shop found in the Wilkinson Student Center.

Y-SERVE

The Center for Service and Learning (Y-Serve) provides meaningful service opportunities, and aims to foster a passion for lifelong service among students.



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- Please ensure that you are applying by priority deadlines
- If you plan on serving a mission right after high school, we strongly encourage you to still apply. If you are accepted into BYU, then you can defer your enrollment until you return home from your mission. Once you receive your call but before you leave, you will need to complete the online missionary deferment to defer both enrollment and academic scholarships (<https://enrollment.byu.edu/missionaries>)
- Make sure you request all required documents including transcripts, ecclesiastical and seminary endorsements, etc. prior to the deadline. Once you have requested your needed documents, you will want to ensure those documents have been submitted.

Financial Aid Workshop

Introduction to Financial Aid and Scholarships

It Is Your Responsibility

You are the one responsible for searching for and applying to as many scholarships as possible. If you are not applying, you are not being considered; if you are not being considered you cannot be awarded. Make a goal to apply for at least 20-30 total scholarships to have a good return on your application process.

Prepare Good Essays

In order to be efficient and manage your time well while applying for scholarships it is helpful to have a couple essays that are already completed and ready to be submitted as part of a scholarship application. You can adjust the essays according to different application requirements. The essays you want to have completed would be a biographical information essay, an educational goals essay, a service/leadership and extracurricular experiences essay, and a financial circumstances/need essay.

Local and National Scholarships

National scholarships will be more competitive than local scholarships so use your best judgment when choosing which scholarships you would like to apply for. Always use prudence when completing applications. You should never be asked to pay to apply for consideration.

Some Suggestions as You Search for Financial Aid and Scholarships

There are a lot of organizations and people you can talk to about Financial Aid and Scholarships. Listed below are a few places and people you can start with as you begin your search.

- Your high school Counselor or TRIO/GEAR UP/College Prep advisor/mentor
- Your employer and/or your parents' employers
- BYU Department (program specific) scholarships
- National and local corporations (Office Depot, Target, Walmart, local banks, etc.)
- Local communities (foundations, community organizations, local businesses or civic groups)
- Organizations (including professional associations) related to your field of interest
- American Indian Tribes may have scholarship options for their registered members

BYU-Provo Financial Aid and Scholarship Information

Participating in SOAR does NOT guarantee a scholarship from the MSS office nor from BYU, however, you will be appropriately considered IF you follow all instructions. The scholarship application deadline for SOAR students is November 1, 2023.

No Separate Application for MSS

There is not a separate Multicultural Student Services (MSS) scholarship application. If you complete the BYU scholarship application (including all "optional" sections—personal information, 3 essays, financial need info/essay), the FAFSA, and apply before the deadline, your application will be reviewed by the MSS office.

Students who complete the university scholarship application, the FAFSA, and are U.S. citizens or permanent residents will be considered for an MSS scholarship at BYU-Provo.

Apply Before SOAR Priority Deadline (November 1, 2023)

Begin the BYU-Provo Scholarship Application by visiting www.byu.edu and logging into myBYU with your Net ID and password. You can navigate to the application by clicking on the "School" drop-down menu, then clicking on "Scholarship Application."

Even if you have not yet been accepted to BYU, you should still complete the BYU scholarship application (writing all optional essays) to be considered upon admission. The application closes on December 15th, thus you must apply before you know your admission status.

The recommended scholarship application deadline for SOAR students is November 1st.

After applying, please remember to print and keep your confirmation page which is proof that you submitted your application.

Additional Benefits

The BYU-Provo Scholarship Application has additional benefits. You will be considered broadly at the university, including other on-campus departments, upon completing the application.

Other benefits

Federal Direct Loans

Student loans must be repaid and are available to both undergraduate and graduate students. Please make sure to fully read and understand your financial obligations with regard to any loan(s).
(studentaid.gov/understand-aid/types/loans/subsidized-unsubsidized)

Federal Pell Grants

Available to undergraduate students only, Pell Grants are awarded according to financial need and do not have to be repaid (apply at [:studentaid.gov/understand-aid/types/grants/pell](https://studentaid.gov/understand-aid/types/grants/pell)).

Keep in mind the appropriate FAFSA deadlines (when to apply).

Insert BYU's institutional code (003670) on your FAFSA application.

Other School Applications

The BYU-Provo scholarship application is for BYU-Provo only.

If you apply for admission to other CES schools, you must also complete their independent scholarship application(s). Always complete the most comprehensive application including essays that may appear as optional.

Scholarship applications are separate and you should complete a scholarship application for each CES school.

Scholarships are not transferable between CES schools.

Other Scholarship Applications

There are additional scholarship resources accessible through scholarship.byu.edu and byu.scholarshipuniverse.com

The more scholarships you apply to, the better your odds are of being awarded one or multiple.

Remember you can stack scholarships, there is no limit as to how much you can earn. Once tuition has been paid, any money left over is refunded to you.

Save your essays to an external software program like Google Docs or Microsoft Word. Essays are often not saved in scholarship applications. Saving them in another program will also allow you to access them at any point in your college career.

Make sure to plan ahead for expenses. These can include, but are not limited to, tuition, books, school supplies, housing, food, transportation, activities, and so on.






The SOAR priority deadline is **NOVEMBER 1st**. You must complete these three steps before November 1st
1. BYU Application, 2. FAFSA, 3. BYU Scholarship.

STEP 1: BYU APPLICATION

Getting Started:

- ☐ Go to the URL: enrollment.byu.edu/applying
- ☐ Sign in with your BYU Net ID (see page 1)
- ☐ Apply to any or all CES schools at the same time
 - There is a separate fee for each school; CES schools do not take fee waivers.
- ☐ Apply as a "New Freshman"

Educational History/HS Information:

- ☐ Read the instructions and fill in the high school information requested
- ☐ Request an official copy of your transcript from your high school
- ☐ Input your high school transcript information carefully/correctly, exactly as it appears on your official transcript
 - If admitted, you will be asked to provide an official high school transcript and it must match your application or admission may be rescinded.

****If you attended an international school, you may need to arrange for academic documents to be evaluated by a third-party evaluator, which may take an extra 4-6 weeks. Read and follow all instructions carefully.**

Ecclesiastical Endorsements:

- ☐ Set separate appointments with both your bishop and stake president (in that order)
 - Do this early to make sure their busy schedules accommodate your timeline.
- ☐ Read through the Church Educational System Honor Code (found at: <https://honorcode.byu.edu/>)
 - Be able to commit to living the standards.
 - If you have questions, be prepared to ask them during your interviews.
- ☐ Check your admission status page to verify that BYU has received your endorsements.

Seminary Endorsement:

- ☐ Talk with your seminary teacher and formally ask for his/her recommendation.
 - This is completed online.
- ☐ Check your admission status page to verify that BYU has received your endorsement.

Recommendations:

- ☐ Kindly ask your recommenders for their support.
 - Letters of recommendation from specific high school teachers are required.
 - Teachers complete recommendations online.
- ☐ Carefully enter their email address correctly on your application.
- ☐ Check your admission status page to verify that BYU has received your recommendations.

Essays:

- ☐ Carefully read each essay prompt and think about what is being asked.
- ☐ Think about what makes your experience different and write about it; tell your story!
 - Remember to positively represent yourself--focus on your efforts to overcome, your personal growth, and what you have learned.
 - Before deciding what activities to write about, we recommend making a list (you can use the note section in the back of this guide) of everything you've done since age 14; this list will help you determine what's most important to you and what you'll choose to write about.
- ☐ Email essays to your MSS Advisor before **October 1st**, if you want feedback
- ☐ Proofread your essays many times!
- ☐ Do not leave any essays blank!

On-Campus Housing Selection:

- ☐ Select on-campus housing if that is part of the application and you want to be considered for options.
 - Freshmen who meet the **November 1st** SOAR Priority Deadline may have better on-campus housing selection date options

Status Page:

- ☐ Once you begin your application, view the status of your application often to track where you are in the process.
- ☐ Follow up on any sections not complete.
- ☐ You cannot submit your application with incomplete sections.
- ☐ If you do not understand something on your status page, you may contact your MSS Advisor for assistance.

Submit Application:

- ☐ Your application will NOT be complete until you have finished all the pages within each section, and click the final "Submit Application".
- ☐ Proofread your information carefully before submitting your application.
- ☐ Click "Submit Application" at the bottom of your status page after all parts of the application are complete.
- ☐ Verify your time/date confirmation on the top of your status page to make sure the application was submitted fully.

NOTES TO CONSIDER:

Multiple Net IDs:

- ☐ If you are missing some information that you know was submitted, double check to make sure that you don't have two Net IDs.
 - ☐ If multiple Net IDs were created, contact the BYU Records Office at 801-422-2631 to have them merged. Then notify your MSS Advisor of the change.

Updating application after submitting:

- ☐ If you want to update your application (make changes), you must first withdraw and then resubmit it. Doing so will delete your first date/time stamp which may have been beneficial in your on-campus housing selection. If you feel you must update anything after you clicked the final submit, contact your MSS Advisor first to discuss what this may mean for you.

Other college options:

- ☐ It is strongly recommended students apply to other colleges for additional options.
- ☐ Even if you think you only want to attend one particular institution, it is crucial to put in place possibilities.
- ☐ Applying to two or three other colleges, with at least one of those options having guaranteed admission will provide a safety net of opportunity.
